

Late Shri. C.S.BEMBALAGI (1881-1983)



After whom the faculty of Arts is named,

Shri.Channabasappa Shivalingappa Bembalagi was born on 11th August 1881, was rich, enthusiastic and great lover of education. He became the first donor of our Samiti, which made the beginning of our institution. The samiti with deep sense of gratitude named the Arts Faculty after him as "C.S.Bembalagi Arts College Ramdurg" in 1966.

He was also responsible to start "Shri. Falahareshwar Uchit Prasada Nilaya" which provided free boarding and lodging to the poor and deserving students in those days. As a member of Praja Sangha during "Ramdurg state Liberation Movement", he worked whole heartedly for the cause of farmers. The marathon innings of this ever energetic old man and chief patron of our institution came to an end on 4th June 1983.

Late Shri. SHA.M.R.PALARESHA (1919-1998)

Sha.Motilal Raichand Palaresha was born in 1919, hailed from Rajastan to Ramdurg for business. Though his mother-tongue was Marwadi, he was well versed in Kannada, Gujarati and Hindi Languages. This multi-linguistic knowledge helped him to develop the business magnificently.

He made a generous donation to our Samiti for the Cause of higher education of the youths of this region. As a matter of pride and honour the Science Faculty is named after him as "Sha.Motilal Raichand Palaresha Science College, Ramdurg". The philanthropist and the man with concern for education and social commitments had lost his breath on 11th May, 1998.

Late Shri. G.L.RATHI (1902-1996)



After whom the faculty of Commerce is named.

Mr.Giridharlal Lachamandas Rathi was born in 1902, involved himself in business from the beginning. He was very much influenced by Gandhiji's life and thoughts and took active participation in the freedom movement. As a result he was imprisoned from 1939 to 1942.

He was firmly committed to the social services. He made a large number of donations for the cause of education and social reforms. As a matter of pride and respect the Commerce Faculty is named after him as "Giridharlal Lachamandas Rathi Commerce College, Ramdurg".

He derived pleasure in entertaining Sadhus and Saints visiting our state. It is a matter of immense pleasure and pride for his family that the college new building is constructed in place where he was imprisoned during freedom movement.

The follower of Ghandhiji, the freedom fighter and grand patron of our college Shri.G.L.Rathi had lost his breath on 9th January, 1996.

ABOUT OUR COLLEGE

Our Vidya Prasarak Samiti's C.S.Bembalagi Arts, Sha.M.R.Palaresha Science & G.L.Rathi Commerce Degree College is a center for quality and excellent learning in Ramdurg a taluka of Belagavi District of Karnataka State. Till 1965, the year in which Vidya Prasarak Samiti was established, the students of Ramdurg did not have the facility of higher education. Keeping in view of providing higher education to the students of this area, a band of eight enthusiastic citizens of Ramdurg put their dedicated efforts and sacrifice to establish an educational institution at Ramdurg.

The donations by the grand patrons generous philanthropists namely- Late Shri.Channabasappa. Shivalingappa. Bembalagi, Late Sha. Motilal Raichand Palaresha and Late Giridharlal Lachamandas Rathi helped a lot to realise the dream of establishing educational institution of higher education at Ramdurg by Vidya Prasarak Samiti. As a matter of respect and honour the Arts faculty was started in 1966, is named after Late Shri.C.S.Bembalagi. The Science faculty started in 1968 is named after Sha.M.R.Palaresha and Commerce faculty started in 1971, is named after Late G.L.Rathi. So also the Chemistry Laboratory is named as "Late Dr.S.N.Kulkarni Chemistry Laboratory" and Our Library as "Late Shri.I.A.Puranik Library".

Since the year of inception of our college we are the been pioneers to motivate and develop competence among students who are basically from socially and economically disadvantaged groups. Our college as a unit, is endeavouring to upgrade rural talent to the urban competency level. Since its inception till 2011, the gold medals and University Ranks have been secured by 13 students. About 17 students have the honour of University Blue in different games. 17 students have participated in Republic Day Parade at New Delhi.

The constructive participation of the Management in academic activities and recruitment of staff purely on the basis of merit has led to qualified, experienced and competent staff members with 11 Doctorates and 8 M.Phil degrees who have published 108 research papers. Dr.S.V.Kulkarni was invited by Karnataka Public Service Commission to evaluate answer scripts of Gazetted Probationary Officer in 2012 and in 2016. A conducive academic atmosphere has led to the completion of 07 minor research projects. The college has organized five University Grants Commission funded National Seminars apart from six workshops.

The college has earned a recongition in academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular aspects. In addressing the need for academic expansion, the institution has applied for P.G. course in Commerce. The academic excellence of the institution is best reflected in the performance of students. The average result of the outgoing batch from 2011 to 2015 is-BA above-88.80%, B.Sc above 86.85% and B.Com above 73.82% with one University Rank in 2015. (Miss Neha Nellur obtained First Rank to the Rani Chammanna University with three Gold Medals).

The college enriches the teaching-learning by organizing functions under different Associations of Gymkhana and invities eminent scholars and academicians. This plat-form helps the institute to expose students to critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper and transform them into lifelong learners.

The college adds value to curriculum by planned activities conducted by the associations of the college. There is a tradition of excellence in cultural activities. Special mention is made of Vishwas Angadi who has won 1st place in Solo Dance at national level in 2014-15 and Basavaraj Pammar has won 1st prize in classical dance in state level inter collegiate cultural festival held in 2015.

The NSS and Youth Red Cross units are very active and conduct outreach activities inculcating the culture of institutional social responsibility in programmes.

The NCC unit of the college for boys and girls is affiliated to 28th Karnataka NCC Battalion, Hubli. Our college NCC cadets have participated in the Republic Day Parade at New Delhi SUO K.M.Lamani (2013), SUO S.L.Rajapoot (2014) and SUO S.S.Sayappanavar (2015). About 50 students have participated in pre R.D.camp at Bangaluru.

The performance of students in sports activities is a matter of great pride. The college has the distinction of producing 13 University Blues (2011-12 to 2015-16). On 27th December 2013 Rani Channamma University Single Ball Badminton (Women) Zonal Tournament was organized by our college in which our college girls have won the championship. In the year 2014-15 our college boys have won the championship in Rani Channamma University Kabaddi (Men) Tournament which was organized by KRCS College, Bailahongal.

Our college students have the prestige of individual sports achievements at national level, six students have participated in Cycle Polo and Roll Ball at national level and Shri.S.S.Gudekar has won 2nd and 3rd place in MAS Wrestling and BELT wrestling respectively at national level in 2013-14.

In June 2015 Shri.K.I.Pailawan and Shri.S.K.Mekhali have participated in international T-20 Cricket Tournament held at Butwal Cricket Ground, Butwal, Nepal.

Our college is organising Workshops, Seminars/Conference to update the knowledge of both the students and the staff. Our students and staff members are participating actively in Seminar/Conferences at state, national and international level.

Mr.Pavan S.Kulkarni of B.Com 3rd Year has bagged cash prizes by presenting papers at state and national level seminars/conferences. He has also presented paper at international seminar at Bombay in February, 2016.

Inspite of these achievements, the college is aware of many challenges which it has to overcome to enhance higher educational goals. There is a need to increase students' employability and make them competent at global level. The spirit of re-accreditation is to take stock through assessment and adapt to the changing academic scenario. 

For the effective curriculum delivery the harmonious and friendly environment is created in the institution. The Calendar of Events for the year and time table for each semester is prepared in advance and effective initiative is taken to implement the programmes as per the schedule.

Faculty members are encouraged to participate in various conferences seminars, workshops, professional empowerment programmes, Orientation and Refresher courses, to update their skills for effective implementation of the curriculum. Students are encouraged to visit library and study reference books, participate in seminars, workshops conducted in the college and outside the college.

The curriculum is split according to the semester schedule and internal assessment and care is taken to complete the syllabus within the prescribed schedule.

There is a choice of medium. Students may write the exam either in English or in Kannada language.

Besides, we encourage the students to attend various training programmes in soft skills, seminars, workshops, debates, sports, NCC and NSS activities.



The disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, and economically weaker sections are monitored by staff members in charge.

➤ Economically weaker students, who are good in academic performance, and backward class (SC/ST and OBC) students are provided scholarships from the government.

- > Some faculties help by paying admission fee of the needy students.
- ➤ In case of student is likely to discontinue, the student is counseled by the staff to continue the programme.
- > Thus effort is made to see that the dropout rate of the students from disadvantaged sections of society is less.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

- Academic calendar is prepared well in advance by our affiliating University for every ensuing academic year as per the needs of the semester system.
- In the beginning of the academic year, IQAC/Academic Committee of the college prepares an academic calendar which summarizes the events, examinations and other activities planned in that particular semester. The academic calendar contains the list of events and the probable dates for activities such as internal tests, seminars, guest lectures, functions and so on.
- > Time Table for each semester of each course is prepared by the Time Table Committee of the college well in advance.
- > Teaching plan is prepared for every semester by the concerned teachers before the commencement of a semester.
- ➤ Internal Test schedule is prepared by the college Examination Committee.
- > Extra classes, if necessary, are conducted to cover the back log of the syllabus.
- Question paper pattern along with marks distribution pattern of theory examination and scheme of assessment for practical examination is notified /informed to the students well in advance.

- ➤ Time Table is prepared by the Examination Committee soon after the commencement of semester classes for conducting 1st and 2nd internal assessment tests during 8th and 12th week of for each semester.
- First Internal Assessment Test is conducted for 20 marks and marks scored by students will be reduced to 4 marks. Second Internal Assessment Test is conducted for 20 marks and the marks scored by the student will be reduced to 10 marks. 3 marks are meant for assignment and 3 marks are meant for attendance of the student. All together the total theory IA marks will be 20 marks for each subject.
- ➤ Internal practical tests are conducted once in every semester before the practical examination for 40 marks and then it is reduced to 10 marks for practical Internal Assessment Marks.
- ➤ Internal Assessment Marks are submitted to the University at the end of each semester in the prescribed formats.
- Examination for the remaining 80 marks in each paper/subject is conducted at the end of each semester as per affiliated University Examination schedule.
- > Final practical examination for 40 marks is conducted as per the examination schedule of the University.
- > Our faculties are deputed to take up the evaluation of the theory answer scripts at the central valuation held by the university.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching learning process?

IQAC plays a vital role in the quality enhancement in tuning the goals and objectives of the college and nourishment of the teaching learning process by means of instructions and encouragement to the faculty, staff and students in the following ways.

- > The evaluation through these approaches gives lot of information about student achievement after teaching a


- particular unit. The teacher concerned takes necessary steps for his /her improvement during tests/examinations.



- ➤ As per requirement, the consultancy service is made available from the authorized lab-technicians for new equipments.





superintendent, librarian and the physical director.














Organization of Non-Teaching Staff
